Completing her 31st year in government service with the U.S. Census Bureau in the New York Regional Office, Rosemarie Fogarty has worked in the business and current survey area collecting data in the field as well as working on the current survey programs in the office. For the past 23 years she has worked in the Partnership and Data Services Program both as an Information Services Assistant and Specialist, disseminating data to businesses and the community.

During the 1990 Census, she worked in the administration area at the New York Regional Census Center. During Census 2000, she trained 50 temporary Partnership and Data Services Specialists who, in turn, reached out to communities to bring awareness about the importance of the Census and the data it provides. For the 2010 Census, she will continue to work with Partnership Specialists and communities to educate and increase awareness about the importance of the decennial Census. Special emphasis and efforts will be placed on reaching populations that traditionally respond poorly and are historically undercounted.

Over the past few years, Ms. Fogarty has been fortunate to receive the following awards: Census Award of Excellence (1993) for work during the 1990 Census; Hammer Award - Reinventing Government (1999) for work with the American Community Survey; Customer Service Award (2006, 2002, 1999); and Federal Executive Board Direct Customer Service Award (May 2007).

Diane Gibson is currently an Associate Professor at the School of Public Affairs at Baruch College - CUNY and the Executive Director of the New York Census Research Data Center. Her research focuses on the relationship between means-tested social program participation and weight status, other factors that are expected to influence an individual's weight status such as the neighborhood food environment, and the relationship between a neighborhood's demographic characteristics and the availability of amenities and economic development incentives in the neighborhood. She is also a member of the Policy and Research Committee of the Food Bank for New York City. She received her Ph.D. in Public Policy from the University of Chicago.
