

Cyber-bullying Statement

Cyber-bullying is defined as the intentional and repeated mistreatment of others through the use of technology, such as computers, cell phones and other electronic devices.

Cyber-bullying involves the use of information and communication technologies to support deliberate, repeated, and hostile behavior by an individual or group that is intended to harm others.

Baruch College imposes certain responsibilities and obligations, and is subject to College policies, and local, state, and federal laws. In making appropriate use of Baruch College computing resources students are not permitted to use mail or messaging services to harass, intimidate, or otherwise annoy another person, for example, by broadcasting unsolicited messages, or sending unwanted mail.

If Baruch College is made aware that cyber-bullying/harassment is taking place through the use of Baruch College services, and/or personal technological devices, such actions will result in, but not limited to, judicial sanctions. The disciplinary actions taken by Baruch College does not shield from any criminal charges that may be taken against the harasser.
